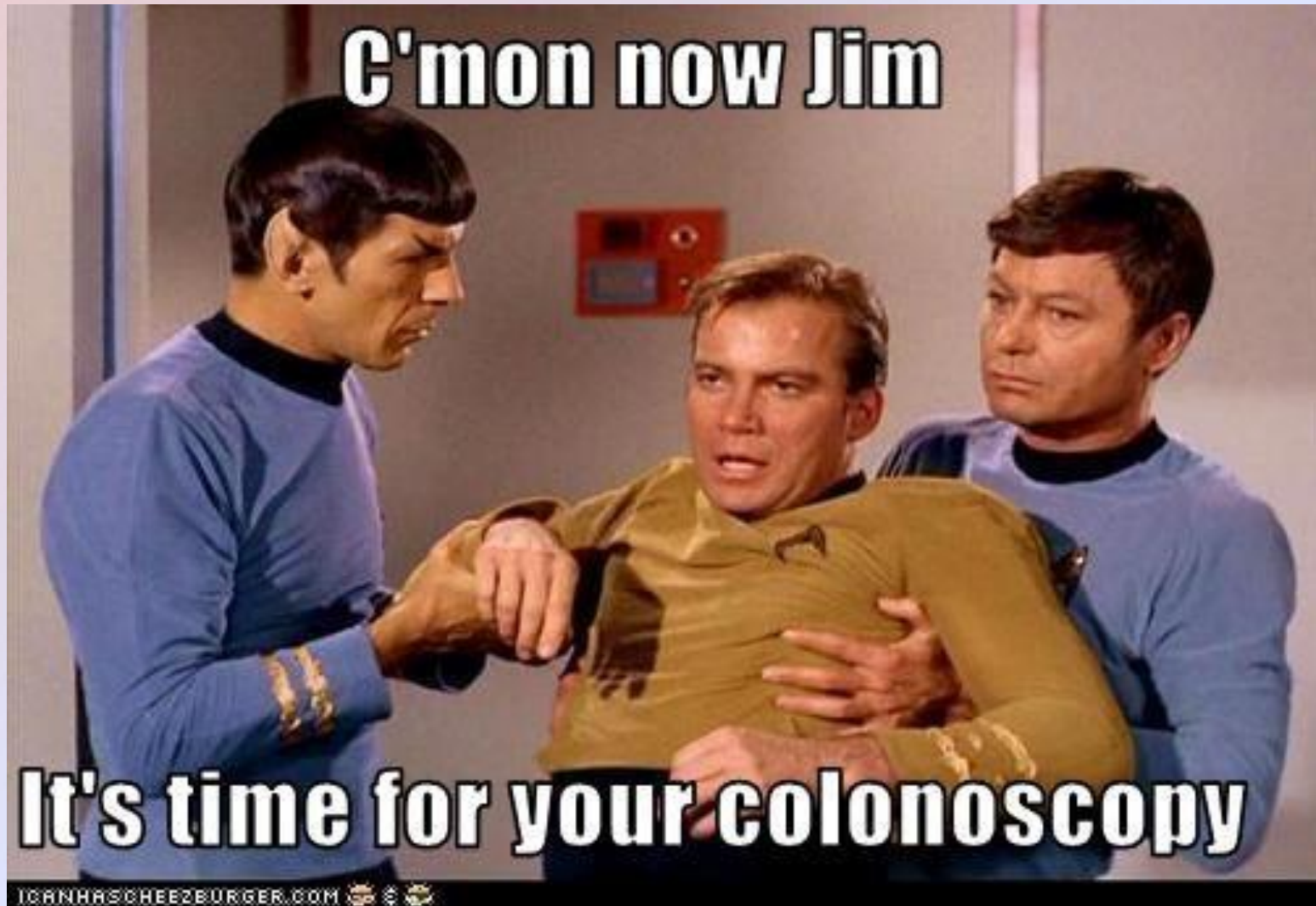

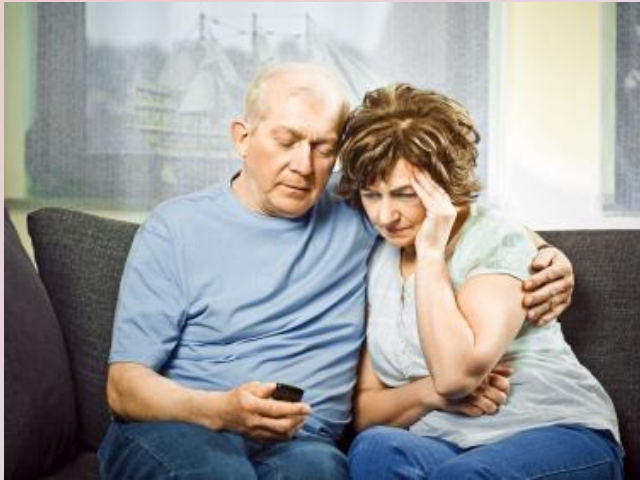

Abdominoperineal Resection

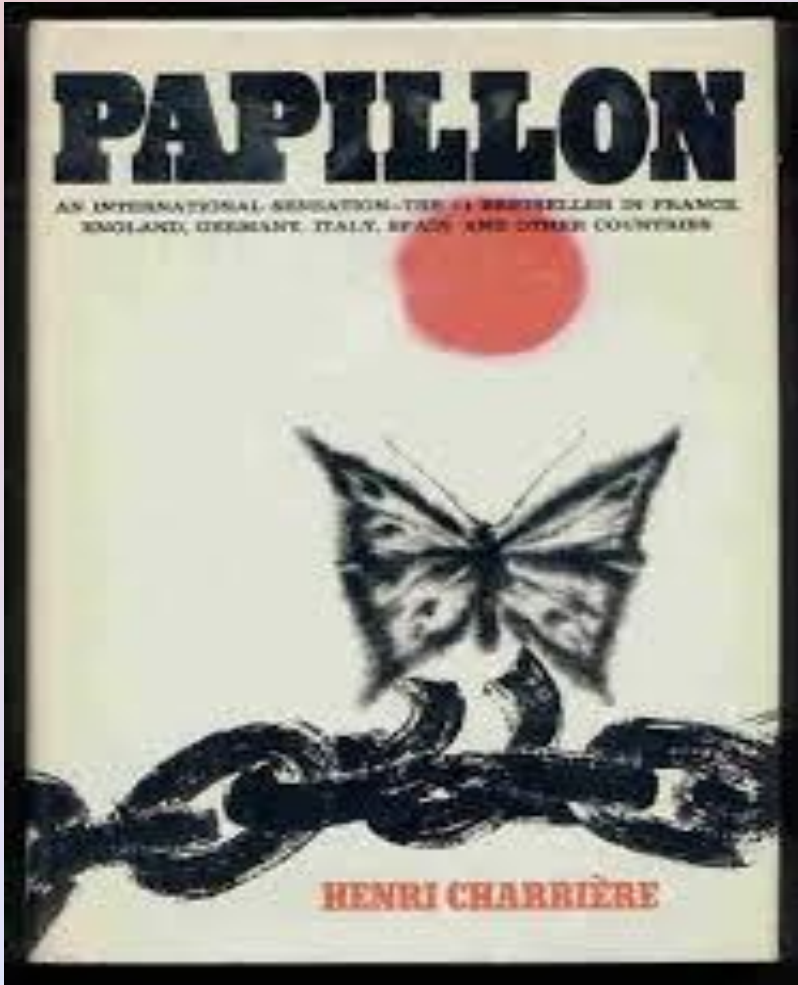


My Treatment Options

AKA Shrinking it and using the hole which is already there!



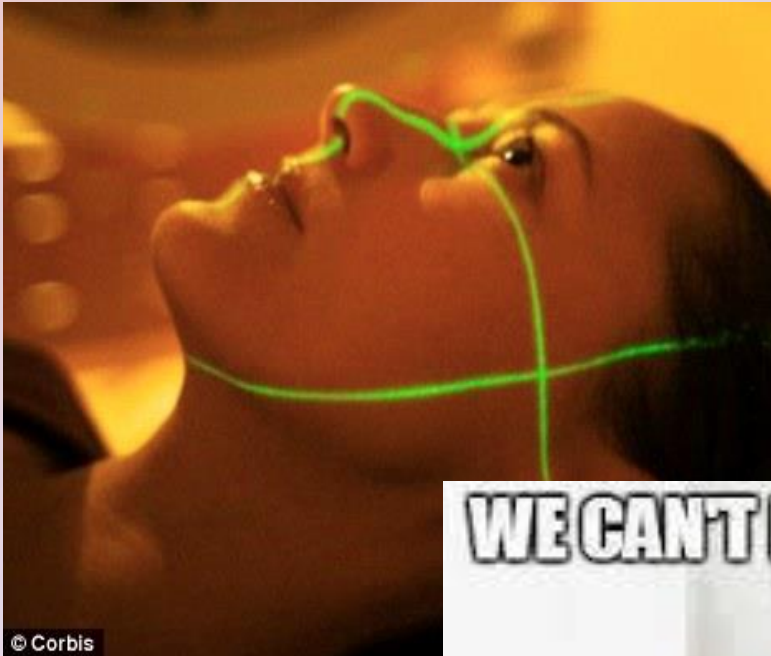

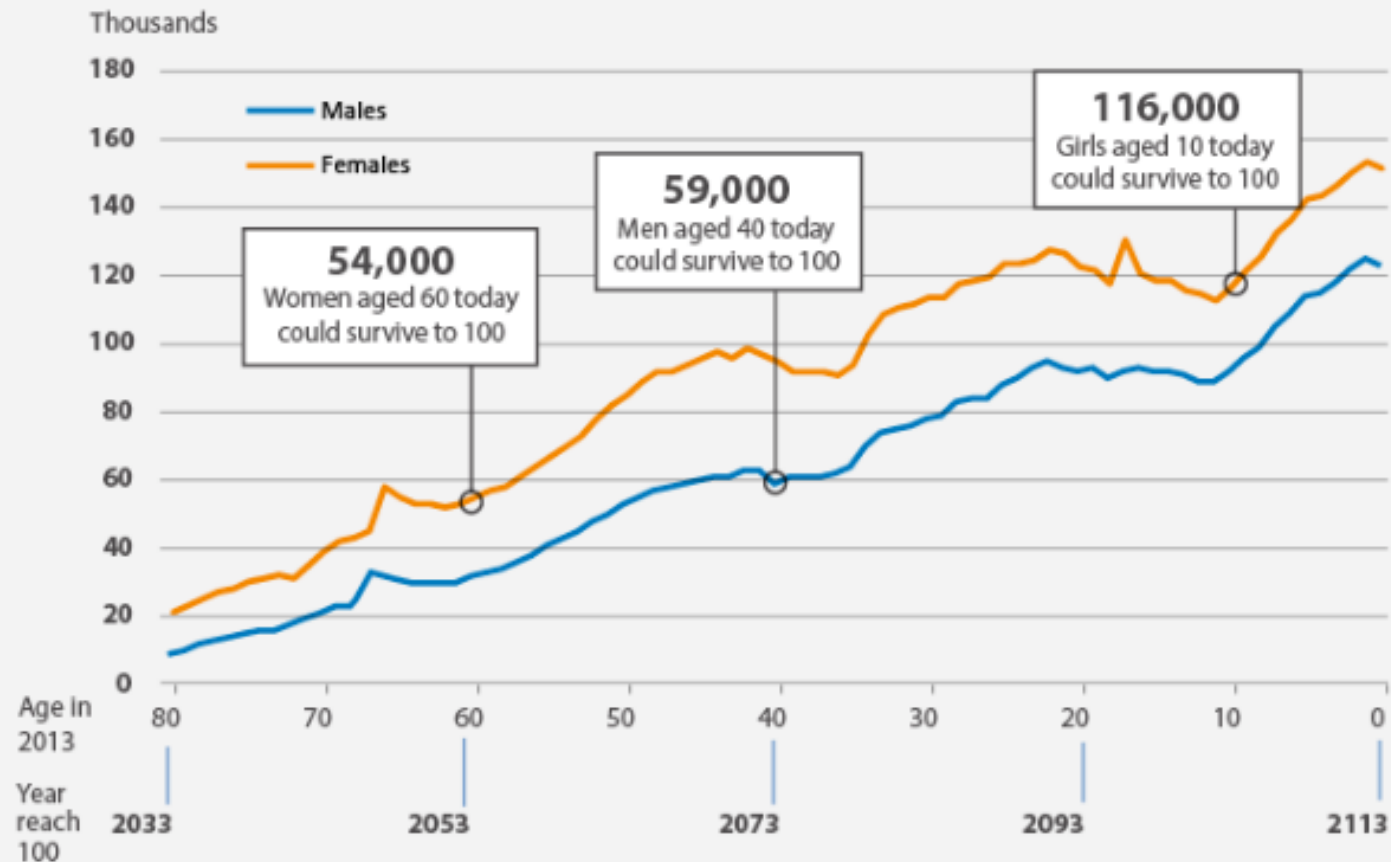


It's not just physical and mental cost

- A calculation of the burden of cancer in the EU shows that the costs for loss of working days was around €9.43 billion Euro*
- A calculation of the expected lifetime costs for all cancers borne by employers in Australia is \$220 million dollars, or \$7000 dollars per person – largely consisting of overtime and management costs of temporary absenteeism, and search, hiring and retraining costs of workers that leave paid employment**

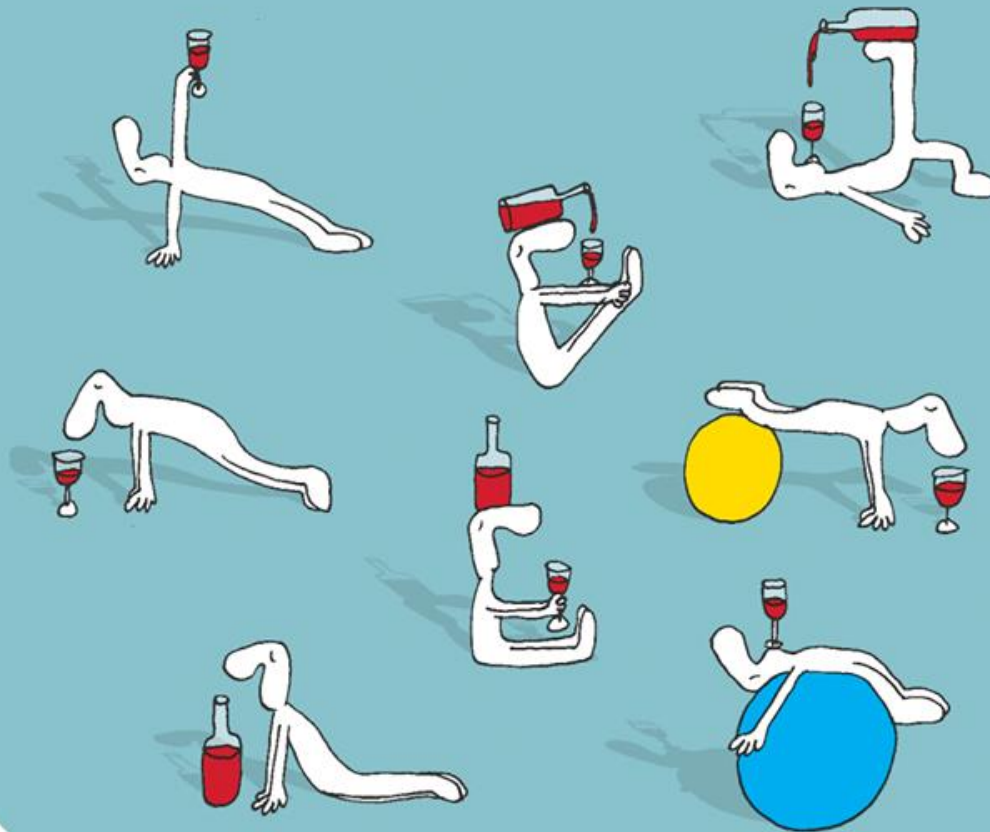
UK aging population
